NIH awarded \$155.3 MILLION¹ in grants and contracts during FY2022 that directly supported 2,725 JOBS² and \$387 MILLION² economic activity in Nebraska.

The highest annual occurrences of disease deaths in Nebraska are due to CANCER, HEART DISEASE, COVID-19, CHRONIC LOWER RESPIRATORY DISEASES (CLRD) and STROKE.3
